Dear Parents,

St Michael's continues to impress me in many ways! In this newsletter, you will gain an impression of the enormous wide-range of trips and extra-curricular opportunities on offer. St Michael's has a tradition of taking students beyond the confines of the school buildings and out into the wider world to experience first-hand other cultures or to the places where events from History took place. The nature of modern education is that it needs to adapt to the demands of the time and respond to the wishes of students: Some of our Sixth Formers recently said they wanted to go on a ski trip – and so this is in the process of being organised!

Parents of students in Year 11 will know the challenges faced by the new GCSEs – they are designed to be harder and have greater content than before. Many of the teachers at St Michael's have been concerned about the wellbeing of our students as they try to cope with the substantial workload involved. It is for this reason that the current Year 9 (and future year groups) will study for only 10 GCSEs (rather than 11). I hope that this will reduce anxiety and provide greater scope for maintaining a balance between schoolwork and extra-curricular activities. I know from contact with university admissions tutors that they are interested only in the quality of the grades achieved, and not the number of subjects.

I want our young people to enter the world with a healthy approach to their studies – and so I encourage them to maintain interests beyond their schoolwork – and be involved in extra-curricular activities either at school or beyond.

Recently we raised over £16,000 at our hugely successful Christmas Fayre.

lives. The Westminster Pilgrimage to
Lourdes occurs every year and the Diocese
provides a service to ill or elderly people
that need assistance. We would be providing
our service as redcaps, assigned to a specific
assisted pilgrim, helping them through processions and religious ceremonies, as well as
building strong relationships along the way.

The coach journey to Lourdes was long but
enjoyable. A few of the Year 12 students
had been to Lourdes before and were able

to offer reassurance when it came to any doubts or worries that we had. At the Hotel Stella, we were given the opportunity to relax as well as practice our readings, music and dances for the Rosary Prayer Service which was to be taking place the following day. We were under pressure as Cardinal Vincent Nichols would be present and the reputation of St. Michael's was on the line. More importantly it was an opportunity to aid people in their prayer to God on pilgrimage. After numerous rehearsals, it is safe to say that the prayer service was beautiful and appreciated massively by the Cardinal, as he stated that he had never seen a more beautiful representation of the Rosary. This spurred us on for the week and filled everyone with a determination to make the most out of every aspect of the pilgrimage. Some redcaps were assigned to the local hospital called the St. Frai, while others were assigned to a group named St. Joseph's who all had an individual mental disability. Everyone had the opportunity to make the most out of the spiritual adventure; whether it was going to the Sacrament of Reconciliation or going to the famous Lourdes baths – we were able to grow and find parts of ourselves that had not yet been revealed to us. Something about devoting time, energy and love to those who desperately need it is an indescribable feeling. Perhaps the most unforgettable part was the torchlight procession. The Westminster diocese were to lead with Redcaps holding banners and guiding the assisted pilgrims, followed by all the other pilgrims that had travelled from across the world, holding candles as a symbol of their faith in the Lord. It was mesmerising seeing so many flags and nationalities united in prayer and reflection. Besides the intense work throughout the day, we had the chance to explore Lourdes in

the evenings. The diocese hosted nightly socials for Redcaps to make new friends. It was lovely to be able to appreciate Lourdes as the fun, busy and vibrant town that it is. After an unforgettable week, it was time for the long journey home. This trip would not have been made possible without the commitment of the teachers, especially Miss. Devlin. The week will be treasured by all who took part for the rest of our lives.



Y7 Tower of London History Trip
